






2022: PARTNERSHIP ACTIVITIES

ECONOMY PILLAR ACTIVITIES

- Land use compatibility for agricultural lands e.g.:
 - > 26. Amend zoning to encourage on-farm processing
 - > 33. Ensure preservation of farmland through proactive land-use and other policies
- Build more employment
 - > 35. Develop incentives to support ecological farming approaches or techniques
 - > 38 Encourage green entrepreneurship through incentives and programs, e.g., Wild Heart Forest School



ECONOMY PILLAR ACTIVITIES, CONT'D

- Work with Community Futures Oxford to explore the opportunity of B Corp Certification in Oxford
- Support new Legacy Fund agreement

ENVIRONMENT PILLAR ACTIVITIES

- Waste to resource at...
 - the industrial level, e.g., StormFisher+Generate,
 - the institutional level, e.g. Woodstock General
 - the residential level, e.g., popularization of the residential waste audit
- Tree planting: 10,000 trees
- County fleet to show leadership and cause emulation, aspiration



ENVIRONMENT PILLAR ACTIVITIES, CONT'D

- Mentor pillar members as part of a succession plan
- Continue to host networking events
- Zero Waste Oxford
 - > Institutional and Industrial focus
 - > On-site composting (residential)
- Meadow creation, wetland restoration
- Partnership with Tourism Oxford: Leave-a-Legacy (tree planting as a token of appreciation)
